What do we mean with citizens and stakeholders engagement?

- Activating involvement, participation, and interaction of citizens and relevant entities or groups (stakeholders).
- **Ensuring** that **diverse** perspectives, opinions, and interests are considered and included in policies, programs and projects.
- **Connecting** communities, citizens and stakeholders into the process and outcomes collectively built.
- Shaping outcomes and fostering collaborative efforts





Why is citizens and stakeholder participation key?

Without it:

- Failure to **address communities' needs** (e.g., outcomes are based on what is thought is needed rather what is needed)

- Hampered implementation, or failure to turn a plan or project into reality, because of **stakeholders' backlash**






